THE earth went mad, heaving itself in a giant, retching shudder. . . Ten minutes after the California earthquake an amateur station was on the air, telling

Through the night, other amateurs emerged painfully from the wreckage, salvaged parts and tubes and power-supply facilities sufficient to get their stations back on the air again. Aid was offered the civic and military authorities in

control of the situation; personal messages to relatives and friends of earthquake survivors commenced to trickle in: an avid press pleaded for information. The amateur emergency work of the Southern California earthquake on March 10th began in grim, actual

Six hours elapsed before any vestige of wire line service was through to Long Beach, center of the stricken area. It was four hours before broadcast station KFOX regained the air, the roof having fallen in the dynamo room. During this time amateur radio was the sole means of announcement and communication, and during the week following, when wire lines could not handle any appreciable percentage of the traffic, amateurs stepped to the fore as second to none in usefulness and efficiency.

The first official messages

to be transmitted were from Mayor Harris of Long Beach and Mayor Porter of Los Angeles to the Adjutant-General of the state, requesting aid and reporting the loss of many lives. These were QST'ed by Francis M. Sarver, W6AOR, of Los Angeles, and by stations in the Long Beach and San Diego areas. A later message was addressed to Army officials at Washington, via WAR, requesting that the military at San Diego and surrounding points be instructed to operate in the *W1CBD, Assistant to the Secretary, A.R.R.L.

emergency zone. When they did take over control, Major Albert M. Jones, head of the intelligence department of the 9th Corps Area, invoked the aid of amateur radio in handling his branch of the work, with schedules between Long Beach and San Pedro.

A five-station net centering on W6GSR in Long Beach was for a considerable time the only means of communication with the Navy Yard at San Pedro, the National Guard headquarters there, and the governor's office and state motor patrol

officers at Sacramento. George F. Movnahan, Jr. W6AXT, was the Sacramento station, with C. N. Fisher, W6FFN, Covina, W6ETV, San Pedro, and Vernal Routh, W6CJQ, Los Angeles, as relay points Messages were handled for Governor Rolph and Lt. Governor Frank Merriam. W6GSR was put out of commission by a severe shock at midnight, but was back on the air within an hour with a hastily rigged small portable set.

Al Martin, Jr., W6BYF, one of the first stations on the air in Long Beach after the first heavy tremors, handled official traffic exclusively from his installation at American Legion hall, where he was assisted by half a dozen operators. Great quantities of supplies equipment and personne were secured through this

KFOX, the Long Beach broadcasting station, which

late in the evening began operating from an emergency booth in the Bail Bond office opposite City Hall, was overwhelmed with requests to broadcast messages reassuring relatives and friends of the safety of families and individuals, and turned this traffic over to amateur stations as well as making announcements of the A.R.R.L. service. The bulk of the traffic received through this source was handled by W6BVD, assisted by W6BXI, W6UY, W6BQP and W6GXS. The biggest difficulty lay in the fact that the telephone at

Our Founding Premise:

W6BVD was out of order along with hundreds of others, but after a conference with the manager of the telephone company an emergency line was rigged in less than an hour, and messages poured in along it in a steady stream.

In Los Angeles, where the damage was not nearly as great, nearly every active amateur in the city was to be found on watch. A big part of the relief traffic was with battleships lying off the California coast, whose officers and men had families ashore in the

stricken cities. KFI, of Los Angeles, duplicated to some extent the work of KFOX in broadcasting information concerning the condition more effective.

of individual families, but here again amateur radio service The Los Angeles

Police Department through municipal police radio station KGPL broadcast an urgent request for the erection of an amateur 'phone station at Los Angeles Patriotic Hall Amateurs Nikirk Cook and Strople of Passa dena responded and got W6BZC on the air, operating for 30 hours continuously. On the morning of March 13th, KFI broadcast a call for four amateur operators with portable receiving and transmitting equipment—and probably got them, although no further details are available.

Martin Corcoran, W6GOY, Artesia, W6GWX, South Pasadena, and stations in San Diego. Whittier, Santa Ana, San Clemente and La Jolla handled more than 500 messages for the American Red Cross, American Legion, Los Angeles General Hospital, Salvation Army, County Welfare

units and the California Highway Patrol. When W6GOY at Artesia announced, "Boy, that was quite a shake!" the operators at W6BZC, in Los Angeles, waited three seconds before feeling the tremor.

The 1.7- and 4-mc. 'phone men did Herculean work, handling traffic to all sections of the country and broadcasting general information. The 1.7-mc. men, particularly, were the best organized of those active in any band during the early part

of the evening; all those in the earthquake area that had workable stations were on. QRM was a problem in the 75meter band, but a group of stations including W6CNE, W6EZY, W8DLD, W9FLT, W8WI, W8AOE, W1CWH

W2GO, W2HY and W9MM helped to clear the band for the

emergency traffic.

One young schoolboy with a simple self-excited transmitter on 1750-kc. and a brand-new "H" license (we can't determine the rest of the call) hooked a microphone and loop around his tank coil and did some of the best of the early work for the authorities. In emergencies all methods are justified! Although his home and station were close to the beach and terrifying rumors of tidal waves were circulating, he didn't run out and hit for the hills, but stayed at his post. Many other amateurs with comparatively little experience did splendid work, proving that the race is to the willing, not to the swift, in times like these.

The number of stations actually contributing to amateur radio's public service record in this emergency reaches into the hundreds; there were dozens in the primary earthquake area alone. We mention, briefly, but with due regard for the importance of their work, the following: W. A. Adams, W6ANN, Long Beach, who handled hundreds of personal messages, delivering much of his traffic direct on 14 mc. Vernon Keavs. W6GRH, Huntington Park, who was on the air by 8:05 p.m. and handled traffic until 10 a.m. hanging onto receiver and transmitter with both hands in involuntary QSK during shocks -- as did most of the other stations in the area; WLVR. WLVG, WLVE --- both the Army and Navy nets displayed wonderful organization; Ludwig A. Hedstrom, W6CIZ, Oakland; who kept continuous watch on 7 mc. for three days, along with A. W. Fuller, W6AF, Oakland; Ed. Stevens, W7BB, Seattle, who took 1500 words of press to an AP direct wire and handled 300 messages in 48 hours' continuous watch. Beginning 1: The Radio Shops

One question that comes to mind is...

- •How is the start of the Moore brothers' radio shop connected with the start of the Orange County Amateur Radio Club in the Winter to Spring of 1933?
- •Our club history goes beyond the name. It is a continuity of members, officers, and eyewitnesses back to 1933, with Earl K. Moore W6IGO, as our first president. The opening of the "Moore Bros" radio repair shop (by Earl K. and Harry A. Moore) at 206 W. 1st St., from January 1933 to later, to their closing by April 1935, sets their location in Santa Ana at this time.
- •There are also signposts.
- •There is an account by an employee (Eleanor Walden) of Montgomery Ward of the club display of an amateur radio station in the store window which opens in August 1933, on the corner of Fourth and Main, in Santa Ana. So the OCARC must have begun between January and August of 1933.
- According to the ARRL, The Orange County Amateur Radio Club becomes an affiliate on March 15th, 1934, while the Moore Bros. radio shop is in business.



RADIO AMATEURS FORM CLUB HERE

Plans for future meetings were being made today following the first meeting of radio amateurs of Orange county here Thursday night. Named the Orange County Amateur Radio club, members of the new organization elected Earl Moore, W6IGO, president, and Tom Jentges, W6BXI, secretary.

Twenty charter members were enrolled at the organization meeting. It was decided to hold future meetings in the Santa Ana Y.M.C.A. building. Other radio operators and amateurs in the county will be invited to join the new group, as well as anyone interested in radio work.

Members of the club voted to join the A.A.R.L. and the Federation of Radio Clubs of Southern California, becoming a part of the two organizations.

Another question that arises is...

- Were we named "The Orange County Amateur Radio Club" from the start?
- According to the ARRL records and the <u>Santa Ana Register</u>, yes.
- However, in the days of the Civil Defense, from Fall 1954 to Spring 1959 the title in the Radio Amateur Callbook is "The Orange County Radio Club." More on this later.

- The witness account states, "...Earl Moore moved to L.A., leaving Harry to run the business."
- However, according to the Radio Amateur Callbooks, <u>Earl doesn't move</u> to L.A. until fall 1937, at the earliest. This is more than two years after "Moore Bros" and "Radio Den" go out of business. So what can explain the two-year delay in the Radio Amateur Callbooks?
- There are three possibilities:
- 1. Latency due to periodicity
- <u>2. Bureaucratic latency and "Snail-Mail" of the time</u>
- 3. Social misalignment between the announcement of Earl's move, and the move itself.
- The latter is the most likely, and the last two both may have played a role in the discrepancy.
- By April of 1935, Moore Bros and Radio Den are closed.

A recent survey including nineteen stations in the club disclosed that we have a total of 3046 watts of power or an average of 160 watts per station. 

February 6-8, 1937: A damaging flood strikes Orange County, wiping out highways, bridges, and threatening lives and homes.

For the first time since 1916, the communities of San Juan Capistrano and San Clemente were isolated when sections of main highways were swept away by flood waters from the Trabuco and San Juan rivers.

(Santa Ana Register, Monday, February 8th, 1937.)

With national attention focused on the service rendered by radio amateurs in the flood emergency, records of the Federal Communications Commission today showed Santa Ana has 30 licensed amateur radio stations.


In each case, the owner of the station is himself a licensed amateur operator.

Often called "the last back-log of communications," the radio amateurs form an unusual group. Each station costs hundreds of dollars, on the average, and long hours of study and practice lie back of each operator's license. Yet any amateur will handle, for nothing, messages which would cost a day's pay on a commercial basis; he is prohibited from making any charge for services rendered.





A series of heavy rainstorms in the costal area, extending from San Diego on the south to San Luis Obispo on the north and inland to parts of the Mojave desert, produced extreme floods. These floods, which appear to have been the greatest within the last 70 years, left 119 people dead and 2,000 homeless. It flowed as fast as 100,000 cubic feet per second, and caused damage estimated at \$78,602,000.00.

SHORT WAVE RADIO. AIDS FLOOD WORK

Nine amateur, short-wave reside operators, representing the "last bulwark for commications," who becadeast on irregular schedules and transmit messages without charge, performed a fine service in Orange county during the foodperiod it was revealed today, sending out between 500 and 700 calls for help or to inform friends or relatives of the condition of loved ones.

The operators, apprised of the fact that telephone and telegraph services between communities was impaired, volunteered to make constants.

With the telephone system so Anahoim out of order, the ameteury also assisted the Anaheim police department as did the operators of the county's police radio stations KGHX. The hundreds of calls were handled by Ed Heffner, WeCNE Ray Hancock, WEALK, and Norst Evans, Well'IM, Santa Ana: Bud Whiteman, WeVT, and Myron Olmmell, WSCMT, Anaheim; another, unidentified Anaheim amateur; E. W. Corbett, Wallan, Fullerton, and Tom Jentges, Wilki and Wendali Jones, WEBYE, Garden Grove.





•In confirmation of this link, I have further discovered, from the IXN History, that the Orange County Radio Club, K6DKF, 12502 "Placincia," Orange, (which is now The City Drive South) is the address of the Orange County Communication Center, in Orange, called the "Dog Patch." It was used for meetings by the OCRC, as well as a separate OC Civil Defense group.

History of OCARC/OCRC Addresses

- •On Sunday, April 8th, 2018, I was doing an internet search for club member John Angel at "205 Oak St.," to verify his information in the Historical Roster, and while on Archive.org, I was searching for his address on "Oak St." While there is no "205 Oak St." in Santa Ana, there was a "207 Oak St." It came up with our club QTH in the Radio Amateur Callbook from the early 60's. This is what was found:
- •In the Orange County Business Directory, January 1933 (radio store), May 1934, and April 1935 (at the earliest): 207 Oak, was the location of "Hall F C" radio service and repairing.
- •In the OCARC Archives, and the Radio Amateur Callbook:

February 9th, 1959 to Fall 1961: 207 Oak, Santa Ana, was the location of the OCARC and OCRC.
