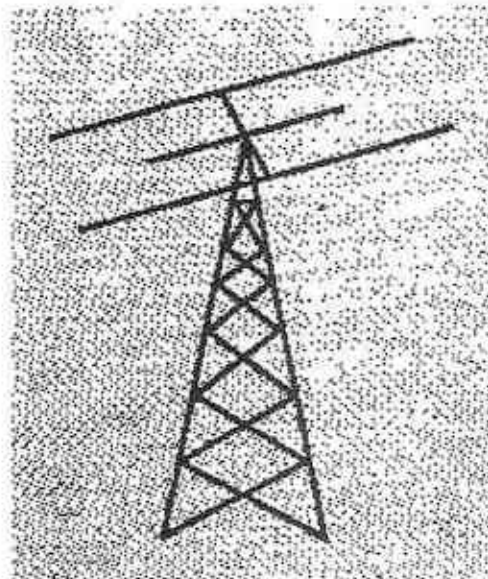

A FRIENDS ESTATE

4th Not-So-DX-pedition was a HOT-So-DX-pedition

The fourth semi-annual "Not-So-DX-pedition got underway on Friday, October 30, 1998 with most of the participants arriving on the lake bed. El Mirage Dry Lake, the favorite venue of many of the participants, was the location.

Arriving in the early part of the morning was Art, KE6WOX and Larry, K6LDC. The spot was secured and the two began the task of setting-up the antennas and the rigs. With almost a non-discernable breeze and mild, warm weather, this task seemed almost a pleasure.

Up went the all band vertical, secured to the ladder of LDC's motorhome, next came the WOX six meter antenna, secured to the rear view mirror on the motorhome door and then Art, WOX began his time consuming task of putting up and attempting to retune his Hustler all band vertical that he inadvertently screwed-up.

LDC made contacts on 20 meters and 40 meters with US stations and a few Canadians. Later in the day LDC made a contact with Mindanao in the Philippine Islands (a DU8) and later that afternoon with a JA3. About this time Frank, WA6VKZ and Steve KE6NEH arrived and it was time to set-up the cook trailer, with awning (a bit more difficult to erect than a 70 foot tower with 8 stacked 4 element 80 meter beams) and his station.

The VKZ generator was rolled out and lo-and-behold, it was sporting a shiny new muffler. If you all remember, the original muffler went down about a year ago, was replaced with a large muffler that promptly broke off taking the flange from the engine cylinder with it during the last field day in June. Now repaired, Frank proudly pressed it into service. After a short period of operation, the OPs there noticed that there was a louder noise

coming from said energy source. Inspection verified the suspicion that the new muffler didn't make it either.

While all this was going on, Elmer (Tom) Thomas, WA6PFA showed up with his truck, camper shell, rig and antenna, a new home-brewed 10 meter rotatable dipole made from copper pipe and a few fittings. It certainly looked like a million bucks watts. Then PFA sprang the truth on us, it has a Gamma match and has not yet been tuned. Out came the MFJ analyzer and after numerous different attempts, unfortunately none of them abiding by the principles of logic and physics, we were able to get a satisfactory match. PFA was now in business. PFA made some good DX contacts with his rig.

Now came the real test of engineering skill and daring. Under the direction of Frank, WA6VKZ, we were about to attempt a feat more difficult than Ziegfried and Roy's making an Elephant disappear. We were going to erect a mast, made up of many sections of aluminum tubing (approx. 40 feet long when assembled) and we would put Frank's all-band VHF vertical on top of it.

A valiant attempt was made; however, someone must have read the plans up-side-down, because it gave in the middle like a long piece of wet spaghetti and VKZ was now the proud owner of an eight foot piece of aluminum tubing with a nearly perfect radial bend. Getting late. We'll try again in the morning.



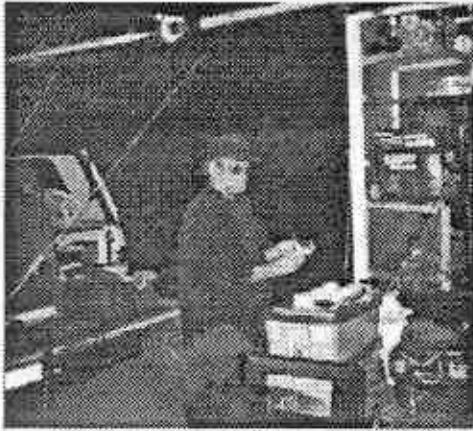

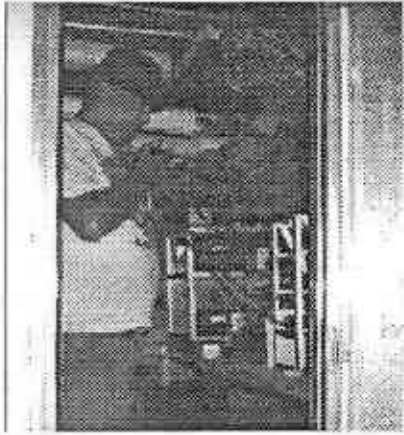

coding tape and then the redo. The VKZ unit was packed and the area was left for the coyotes. It was a great outing. Some of the OPs felt it was our best yet.

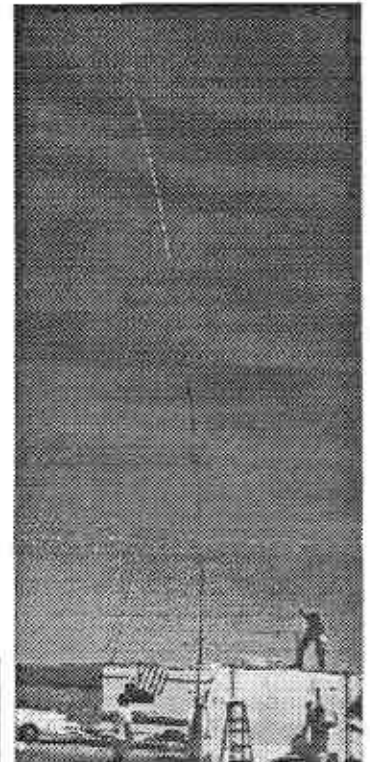
El Mirage certainly has its advantages.

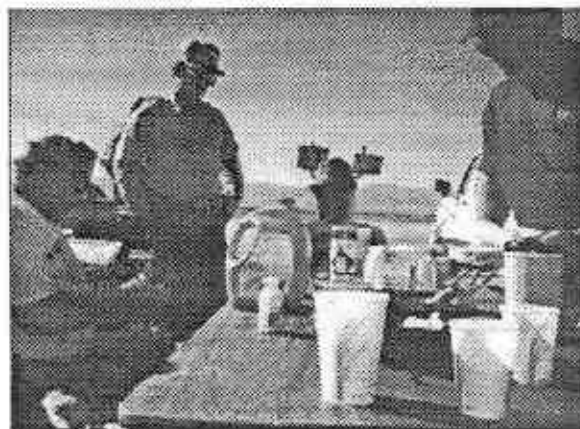
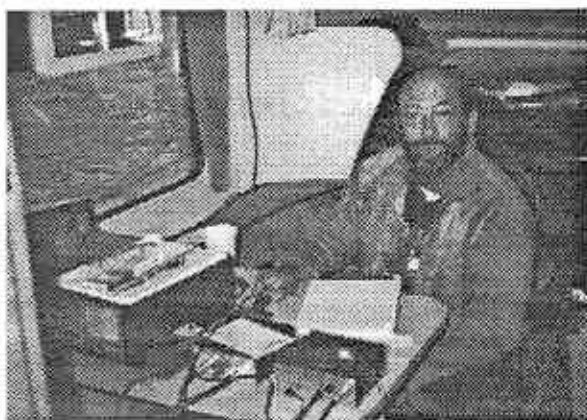
Top left: LDC and PFA adjusting the 10 meter gamma match.

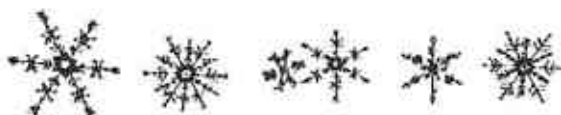

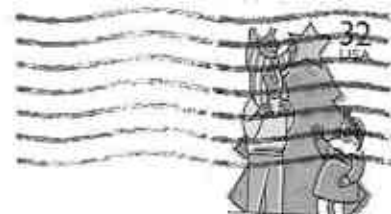
