



PITCAIRN ISLAND FOLLOW-UP

Those who attended the May 1976 meeting of our club remember Dr. Charles "Mert" Moser, W6HS and his talk on the Pitcairn Islanders. Towards the end of that meeting donations were taken towards a power generator for the tiny island. If you ever wondered what happened to the money then read further and see what the OCARC and many other hams and radio clubs worldwide helped to do.

A year ago Pitcairn Island was diagnosed as having a generator power deficiency. The medication needed was a reliable source of power to keep VR6TC on the air, and the place to get the potion was our own dispensary of good life - Amateur Radio.

Now, over 400 donors later the goal of \$2,500 has been reached. Too, the generator has arrived on Pitcairn Island, but minus a fuel tank. (The tank is thought to be still on the ship, on its way back to England.) Regardless, with VR6TC's ingenuity, a substitute will be found or contrived and the generator will be in operation. Thanks to the Radio Amateurs around the world, rare Pitcairn Island QSO's will continue. Monies over and above the cost of the generator will be forwarded to Tom Christian to buy fuel.

A cross section of amateurs throughout the United States contributed as well as amateurs throughout the world. Some of the countries whose amateurs contributed to this project are: Finland Brazil, Mexico, Japan, Canada, Argentina, New Zealand, Venezuela, Italy and Equador.

Mert Moser answered some further questions reguarding this effort.

- Q. How come you (W6HS) talk to VR6TC every week for an hour or so, and a thousand DXers cool their heels waiting for a QSO?
- A. Easy, I like to ragchew, especially since Tom, Betty and the three children have "Uncle Mert" at this end; and any family should keep in touch often even at 5,000 miles. Secondly, I am intensely interested and morally obligated when it comes to health problems, not only to Tom and his family, but to the other Pitcairners living there. Thirdly, after my schedule, work permitting, Tom always makes many contacts, which he would not have had we not had our weekly schedule.
- Q. How many people on Pitcairn Island?
- A. Last Thursday there were 64 Pitcairners. In addition there is the church pastor and his wife (the nurse) and family. Then there is the school teacher, his wife and children. Last, there are six or eight royal engineers and divers from England working on improvements of roads, Bounty Bay (blasting rocks) and extending the landing-jetty.
- Q. Have you (W6HS) ever been to Pitcairn Island?
- A. No. Intermittent and non-scheduled shipping prevents any organized visit to Pitcairn. However, some day I hope to set foot on that island in the Pacific. Pitcairn has no facilities for tourists, etc. Visitors must first get permission from the Island Council and then arrange to stay at the home of a Pitcairner. Betty (VR6TC's XYL) has advised that I'm welcome to use Fletcher's cave, which is air conditioned, and wild berries, pineapples, bananas and papayas are there for the picking.

PITCAIRN ISLAND FOLLOW-UP

- Q. How can I get some of the hand carvings of Miro wood and Pitcairn postage stamps?
- A. Not too easy. The carvings are made by the men when they have spare time from other island duties. Another problem is that Miro wood comes from Henderson Island, which is over a hundred miles away. With patience, and the remittance of about \$12 U.S. per carving, you may request a flying bird, turtle, shark, flying fish or walking cane. Delivery to the United States takes from six to 12 months. As for the rare Pitcairn postage stamps, just the current definitive series are available. Oscar, the postmaster, will handle ordinary requests for the stamps, and a note to him with a remittance of International Money Order will do the trick.
- Q. How big is Pitcairn Island and is there air service there?

 A. Pitcairn Island is about one mile wide and about two miles long. Pitcairn buffs will find a very interesting National Geographic article in the December 1957 issue. Keep in mind that 20 years has passed since the article was written. Air service! Perhaps in the distant future. The island is volcanic and rough. Several years ago a chopper attempted a landing. They had to chop down some coconut trees near the cemetary to get enough level ground for the chopper.
- Q. When is the generator fund going to wind up?
- A. Right now. We have reached our goal, and any monies over will be sent to VR6TC to buy fuel which costs about \$100 U.S. for a 40 Imperial Gallon drum.
- Q. I want to send something to the Pitcairners, a little gift or so. What do you suggest?
- A. That's a hard one to answer. I can only tell you of the things they have been appreciative of in the past. Since their entertainment is simple, Pitcairners make much ado when birthdays arrive. This would lend itself to gifts of cake decorations, candles, napkins, party favors, soft drinks (dry power form), candy, bubble gum, etc. The other activity which all pitcairners take in stride is their vegetable gardens. So, a gift of vegetable seed packets would be welcome.

Ralph Spathelfer, VE&MN, will be net control on 3.782 MHz, Tuesday evenings at 0300 GMT. The first try was 11 January '77 and there were three stations on the air - VE&AN, VE&AD and VE&MN. It will be called "Alaska Hiway Net."

You will find Yukon Amateurs active on 75 Meters at 3782; 40 Meters anywhere; 20 Meters at 14.070 CW and around 14.180 SSB (VE land SSB that is. ... Editor); 15 Meters on SSB and CW sections of the band and 10 Meters at 28.590.

There are about twenty active amateurs in the Yukon territory. That is why there are so few QSO's in contests with them.

THE FCC ANNOUNCED ON FEBRUARY 15 AT THE PERSONAL COMMUNICATIONS 77 SHOW THE RELEASE OF A NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULE MAKING ON THE BANNING OF THE SALE OR MANUFACTURE OF ANY AMPLIFIER COVERING THE 24 - 35 MHZ RANGE. THE FCC WILL ACCEPT COMMENTS (1 ORIGINAL AND 5 COPIES) ON THIS PROPOSAL UNTIL APRIL 25. FURTHER INFORMATION WILL APPEAR IN THE APRIL QST.

THE FCC ALSO EXPECTS TO RELEASE IN A FEW WEEKS A REPORT AND ORDER EFFECTIVE THIRTY DAYS AFTER PUBLICATION THAT WOULD ESTABLISH SPURIOUS AND HARMONIC OUTPUT LIMITS FOR AMATEUR AMPLIFIERS. IT WOULD PROHIBIT ADVERTISING AND SALE OF AMPLIFIERS THAT DO NOT MEET THESE LIMITS. AR

TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS BT

THE FCC ANNOUNCED A MORATORIUM EFFECTIVE MARCH 3, 1977 ON APPLICATIONS FOR SPECIAL EVENTS STATIONS AND NEW SECONDARY STATIONS IN THE AMATEUR SERVICE. AMATEUR SCLASS LICENSEES WHO WERE ELIGIBLE FOR 1 X 2 CALLS ON JANUARY 1, 1977 AND APPLIED FOR THOSE CALLS ON OR BEFORE MARCH 2, 1977 ARE NOT EFFECTED BY THIS RULING. HOWEVER THOSE ELIGIBLE FOR 1 X 2 CALLS ON APRIL 1, 1977 WILL NOT BE ABLE TO HAVE THEM ASSIGNED TO A NEW SECONDARY STATION BUT MUST MODIFY AN EXISTING PRIMARY OR SECONDARY STATION LICENSE TO SHOW THE NEW CALL. ALL AMATEURS CURRENTLY HOLDING SECONDARY STATION LICENSES MAY MODIFY OR RENEW THEM DURING THIS MORATORIUM.
