RADIO ACTIVITY

The exhibits were great and Jim, WA6LFF, did a great job there.

Speaking of activities, the first contest of the "season" started on Friday evening, October 27 at 5 P.M. At around 4:30 P.M. most of the bands began to quiet down, by 4:50 it seemed as if most of the amateurs in the world had gone to bed, it was wierd. After the contest was over I had to reflect on some of my problems and possible solutions.

Jim, WA6LFF, wound up with over 92,000 points, and Rick, N6PE, had over 8,000 points running QRP, less than 5 watts which is quite a feat. Terry, WA6IHZ called and informed me that he had also taken part as did Ernie, WA6FOW, so it looks as if we will have a good club score to send in on this one. Lets not forget that the CW weekend is coming up.

Speaking of CW, by the time you read this the Sweepstakes CW weekend will have passed and the SSB weekend will soon be upon us. If
you come to the November meeting there will be Sweepstakes log
sheets available. Complete rules can be found in the September
issue of QST. The ARRL 160 meter as well as the ARRL 10 meter
contest are coming up during the first two weekends of December.

Congratulations to Rick, N6PE, who took first place in the Orange section for "high band" during the ARRL DX contest on SSB and second place on CW. Good work Rick! John, N6HI, finished third after mounting a strong all band effort. I think that we will have a good showing in the ARRL DX contest of 1980.

TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS

MOST OF THE WARC CONFERENCE ACTIVITY THIS WEEK, INSOFAR AS AMATEUR RADIO IS CONCERNED, WAS IN THE H.F. PRESENT ALLOCATIONS, HAVE STRONG SUPPORT AND RELATIVELY LITTLE OPPOSITION. THERE WAS SOME DISCUSSION OF THE PROPOSED NEW BANDS AT 10, 18 AND 24 MHZ, AND THEY RECEIVED STRONG SUPPORT BY SUCH COUNTRIES AS NEW ZEALAND, NORWAY, AUSTRALIA, YUGOSLAVIA, JORDAN SYRIA AND THE U.S.A. MOST OPPOSITION TO ADDITIONAL AMATEUR SPECTRUM COMES FROM COUNTRIES WHO WISH NO REDUCTION OF THEIR FIXED SERVICE ALLOCATIONS. THE WEEK OF NOVEMBER 5 THROUGH 10 HAS SIX FULL DAYS OF MEETINGS, PLUS SEVERAL NIGHT SESSIONS AS THE CONFERENCE STRUGGLES TO MEET SCHEDULED NOVEMBER 20 CONCLUSION.

QST DE W1AW HR DX BULLETIN NR 8 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON, CT, NOVEMBER 1, 1979

TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS:

HERE IS AN UPDATE ON THE COMING OPERATION FROM THE NEUTRAL ZONE. THE GROUP WILL BE DEPARTING ON NOVEMBER 8. THIS IS A 1200 KM TRIP BY CAR FROM AMMAN, JORDAN. ONCE THEY ARRIVE, THEY WILL SET UP MONOBANDERS FOR EACH OF 20, 15, AND 10 METERS. THREE STATIONS WILL BE CONTINUALLY ACTIVE FOR THE DURATION OF THEIR 10 DAY STAY. THE CALL WILL BE 824A AND QSLS HANDLED BY WA3HUP.

TAISU IN TURKEY IS ACTIVE ON 14230 AT 0300 UTC ON WEDNESDAYS AND THURSDAYS. QSLS GO TO WA1UUA.

FOR A 4 DAY FERIOD BEGINNING ON NOVEMBER 1, SAN FELIX WILL BE ON THE AIR. THE CALL IS PRESNTLY UNKNOWN BUT ONE SOURCE REPORTS THAT IT WILL BE CEEXEA. STANDARD DXPEDITION FREQUENCIES OF 14195 21295 AND 28595 WILL BE USED.

ANOTHER STATION IS NOW OPERATING OUT OF FRANZ JOSEF ISLAND. UA1PGO IS ACTIVE ON SATURDAYS AT 0200 UTC ON 14250.

ZD8TC ON ASCENSION ISLAND HAS BEEN ON NEARLY DAILY ON BOTH 70 AND 40 METERS. FREQUENCIES TO WATCH ARE 3502 AT 2300 UTC AND 7005 AT 2200 UTC.

4W2AA IN NORTH YEMEN IS EXPECTED TO BE ACTIVE IN THE COMING WEEKS. THE FREQUENCY WILL BE 14280 AT 2100 UTC. HE WILL OPERATE AS HIS WORK SCHEDULE PERMITS. QSLS GO TO 12MQP.

THE NEXT DX BULLETIN WILL BE ON FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 9, AT 0100 0400 1500 AND 2200 UTC.

QST DE W1AW HR PROPAGATION FORECAST BULLETIN NR 159 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON CT OCTOBER 29, 1979

TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS

OCTOBER IS CLOSING WITH AN AVERAGE SOLAR FLUX OF ABOUT 212. TEN POINTS ABOVE ANY MONTH SINCE JUNE 1959. IT HAD 23 CONSECUTIVE DAYS WITH THE SOLAR FLUX ABOVE 200, ALSO A CYCLE 21 RECORD. RESULTS OF THIS HAVE BEEN CONSISTENT WORLD WIDE DX ON 28 MHZ, AND THE BEST 50 MHZ OPENINGS IN MORE THAN 20 YEARS. PROSPECTS THROUGH NOVEMBER 5 ARE FOR SOMEWHAT LOWER SOLAR ACTIVITY, BUT WILL ABOVE THE LEVEL NEEDED FOR CONTINUED GOOD HF PROPAGATION. THE 50 MHZ BAND WILL TEND TO OPEN FOR SHORTER AND FEWER PERIODS UNTIL ABOUT NOVEMBER 10. BUT THE BEST DAYS YET FOR THAT BAND SHOULD COME AROUND THE MIDDLE OF NOVEMBER. HIGH SOLAR ACTIVITY PEAKS MAY BRING HIGH SIGNAL ABSORUPTION ON THE LOWER AMATEUR FREQUENCIES AND ESPECIALLY ON HIGH LATITUDE PATHS. THIS IS MORE THE RESULT OF GEOMAGNETIC ACTIVITY THAN OF HIGH SOLAR FLUX OR SUN SPOT NUMBERS. IF THE WWV K INDEX IS BELOW 2, PROPAGATIONS SHOULD BE GOOD ON ALL DX FREQUENCIES. BEST DAYS ARE EXPECTED TO BE OCTOBER 30. NOVEMBER 2, 10 TO 12. AND 14 TO 17.

Seriously, he is an asset to the VIP Radio group with the wonderful personal instruction in CW. The kids have really taken to his method of teaching. Some of our kids have started building their code oscillators. I think Crown Valley School has the lead in oscillators but it changes weekly.

We have managed to connect all the schools together via 2 Meters. We use the 147.645 - 147-045 repeater on Thursdays at 11 AM and 1 PM. (When we are on).

More instructors are needed!! Try us just on week and we promise the kids will convince you to continue. If you don't have the time to help tell your Amateur Radio friends about us.


Remember, VIP needs your old working novice keys and practice oscillators. That old CW rig sitting in the back of your closet can be put to good use by us.






