12. Motion to adjourn was carried.



QST DE W1AW HR PROPAGATION FORECAST BULLETIN NR 23 FROM ARRL HEADQUARTERS NEWINGTON, CT JUNE 7, 1980

## TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS

THE SOLAR FLUX DROPPED FROM 285 IN LATE MAY TO 165 ON JUNE 7, THE LOWEST LEVEL SINCE JANUARY. MORE IMPORTANT IN THE PROPAGATION PICTURE WERE FAIRLY STRONG GEOMAGNETIC DISTURBANCES WHICH BROUGHT NEAR BLACK OUT OF HIGH LATITUDE PROPAGATION ON JUNE 1 AND 6. DISTURBANCES ARE EXPECTED TO CONTINUE, WITH VARYING INTENSITY, UNTIL ABOUT JUNE 12. BY THEN THE SOLAR FLUX WILL BE RISING AGAIN, AND GENERALLY GOOD EARLY SUMMER CONDITIONS SHOULD PREVAIL THROUGH ABOUT JUNE 20. THOUGH NOT PREDICTABLE IN A PRECISE MANNER, INTENSE SPORADIC E LAYER IONIZATION IS A MAJOR PROPAGATION FACTOR ON 21 THROUGH 50 MHZ IN JUNE AND JULY.

THIS MODE PRODUCES VERY STRONG SIGNALS OVER ABOUT 400 TO 1200 MILES, MOST OFTEN IN MID MORNING AND EARLY EVENING, LOCAL TIME. IT ALSO CAUSES OPENINGS OVER MUCH GREATER DISTANCES, THROUGH MULTIPLE CLOUD EFFECTS AND LINKING WITH OTHER PROPAGATION MODES. THE POSSIBILITY OF LONG DISTANCE COMMUNICATION ON 50 AND EVEN 144 MHZ IS A PARTICULARLY EXCITING PROSPECT FOR THE NEXT SIX WEEKS OR SO.

#### TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS

IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 97.107 OF THE FCC RULES, THE FREQUENCY BAND 3.975 TO 3.980 MHZ, REPEAT, 3.975 TO 3.980 MHZ, HAS BEEN DECLARED BY THE FCC KANSAS CITY REGIONAL OFFICE TO BE AVAILABLE FOR USE ONLY FOR EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION IN CONNECTION WITH THE RECENT TORNADOES IN GRAND ISLAND, NEBRASKA, AND VICINITY.

ALL OTHER AMATEUR COMMUNICATION IN THE BAND 3.975 TO 3.980 MHZ IN THE FOLLOWING STATES IS PROHIBITED FOR THE DURATION OF THE COMMUNICATIONS EMERGENCY, ARKANSAS, COLORADO, IOWA, KANSAS, LOUISIANA, MISSISSIPPI, MISSOURI, NEBRASKA, NEW MEXICO, TEXAS, AND WYOMING.

AMATEURS OUTSIDE THE AFFECTED AREA ALSO ARE REQUESTED TO AVOID THE SEGMENT ON A VOLUNTARY BASIS, AND ALL AMATEURS ARE REQUESTED TO REFRAIN FROM ANY OPERATING WHICH MIGHT CAUSE INTERFERENCE TO OTHER EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS IN THE AMATEUR BANDS. PROHIBITION REMAINS IN EFFECT UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE.

## TO ALL RADIO AMATEURS

BEGINNING JULY 1. ASCII BULLETINS WILL BECOME A REGULAR FEATURE OF THE WIAW BULLETIN PROGRAM. TELETYPE BULLETINS ARE NOW SENT AT 0100 0400 AND 2200 UTC DAILY AND AT 1500 UTC MONDAY THROUGH FRIDAY. AT THE CONCLUSION OF EACH TELETYPE TRANSMISSION, THE BULLETINS WILL BE REPEATED ON 110 BAUD 170 HZ SHIFT ASCII. TRANSMISSIONS ON ASCII ARE PRESENTLY BEING CONDUCTED AND WILL BE CONTINUED THROUGH THE MONTH OF JULY.


